It is coming this December! And I don't mean Christmas.

"Along time ago in a galaxy far, far away ..."

Written in blue against the blackness of space, these words pop up at the beginning of every Star Wars movie, signifying that we are about to watch a story transcending time and space. They first appeared in 1977, when the original Star Wars film hit the screen. followed by The Empire Strikes Back and Return of the Jedi.

In 1999, a set of three prequels was launched, and now -- after a long wait -- the first of three sequels is set to be released: The Force Awakens. It promises to be a blockbuster film released during Advent, with many a matinee attender between Christmas and New Year's Day. Go to Target or the Lego Store now and you see these places overflowing with Star Wars stuff, just in time for Christmas. I found tons of Star Wars Advent calendars, but none with shepherds, Wiseman, Mary and Joseph or manger.

Set 30 years after the events of Return of the Jedi, this movie features fresh characters alongside the heroes of previous Star Wars installments -- Luke Skywalker, Han Solo and Princess Leia. You'll also see X-wing fighters, R2-D2, light sabers and Chewbacca. They'll all be back. Actually I watched granddaughter Haley go trick-or-treating as Princess Leia so interest is piquing among the very young. And, of course, you'll experience "the Force." This is a power defined by Jedi Master Obi-Wan Kenobi as "an energy field created by all living things. It surrounds us and penetrates us; it binds the galaxy together." The Force has a light side and a dark side, and can be used for good or for evil.

"The Force is strong in my family," said Luke Skywalker in the trailer for The Force Awakens that I downloaded on my computer. "My father has it. I have it. My sister has it. You have that power, too."

An even stronger force appeared when John the Baptist preached to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him in the River Jordan, "You brood of vipers!" he shouted. "Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come?" He described the people as poisonous snakes, slithering and escaping danger. John encouraged his hearers to "bear fruits worthy of repentance." John challenged folks to focus on the right side of the force and use it for good instead of evil.

Such a message fits the world of *The Force Awakens* as it reminds us that *the greatest evil is the evil that comes from within*, not the evil that attacks us from outside. A fan of *Star Wars*, Bill Reidway says that "any one of us -- even the best of us -- can give in to fear, anger and hatred if we're not vigilant; those are powerful emotions that can blur our senses and cause us to lose sight of what true goodness is."

Goodness doesn't come from being a branch on Abraham's family tree. By the grace of God goodness comes from the doing of good. John warned people to change and avoid Darth Vader like doom. He fell from being noble because he misplaced the value that goodness is expressed through goodness and affection for others. Vader wasn't always this way; he started out as Anakin Skywalker -- a generous, loyal, compassionate boy, so powerful in the Force that many thought he was "The Chosen One" of ancient prophecy. Anakin used the Force to do great good as he grew up, fighting for peace and justice while protecting the innocent and opposing the wicked.

But Anakin lost his way. Over time, he became obsessed with his own passions and fears that they controlled his behavior and breached his empathy. He believed himself to be the wisest, the strongest and the purest; and, finally, he allowed his own ambitions to justify evil over good.

The crowds around John asked, "What then should we do?" It is a contemporary question really. Although John spoke of change, he knew that another would come. I remember, and perhaps you do, too that there was a show-down between Luke and Darth Vader. Instead of relying on violence to defeat violence" Luke reacts with compassion for Vader -- he responds with love. Not an abstract or ceremonial love, but a concrete, self-sacrificial love for the human being that Darth Vader is, even with all his faults."

"There has been an awakening," says a character in *The Force Awakens*. How I wish that there would be something similar within each of us. Let us not be so enamored with Star Wars, but like those who were wise so long ago, follow the Star to the manger and see there the power of God.




Youth Triennium 2016

UPDATE ON ADAM POLLOCK AND MISSION WORK AT INSTEP HOME IN KENYA

Adam has been extremely busy since returning to Instep in early August. As soon as he returned the two directors, Jeff and Carla left to return to the States for their son's wedding leaving him to oversee the running of the home by himself. Carla returned on October 2 and Jeff on October 28. During the time they were gone, Adam was covering for them, Terry Kiser a member of the board was there to cover some of Adam's tasks.



They have started a new program at Instep called Stepping Stones. In Kenya special needs children are totally unwanted and uncared for, none of the other homes have the ability to care for them. Four of these children were already at Instep, with the start of the new program the number has doubled to eight and more on the way. To accommodate the new program the pre-school class was moved to the school building and Adam had to oversee the construction of a new class room. Also water had to be run to the former preschool room and a fenced yard made so the special needs children would be secure.

Adam continues to push to get a waste treatment plant built and operational as the septic system they have has failed. He identified a company out of Florida that has designed a system and has a team in Kenya doing installations. He has run estimates, had a representative of the company out to go over his plans, and with Jeff's return has been able to go visit a site where a system has been installed and is in operation. Most of the needed funds have been raised and he hopes to start construction soon.

Bill Pollock will once again be leading a dental team to Instep in early July. Following him, Ron Pollock will be leading a team from First Presbyterian Church leaving on or around July 15.

The project for the second team has not been identified yet as there are so many projects that Adam is working on at this time. As the time gets nearer we will know better where the most help is needed. However, with getting visas and work papers as difficult to get as it is in Kenya right now, we need to identify the people going and to start the process. Two years ago when we went we used an agent and the cost was a little high. This time Adam has offered to act as our agent, but will need extra time to get the job done.
