Witnesses in a courtroom are sometimes thought to be "non-responsive" when they intentionally or unintentionally duck a question.

DA: "Doctor, how many autopsies have you performed on dead people?"

Witness: "All my autopsies have been performed on dead people."

Lawyer: "What was the first thing your husband said to you when he woke that morning?"

Witness: "He said, 'Where am I, Cathy?'" **Lawyer:** "And why did that upset you?"

Witness: "My name is Susan."

DA: "Doctor, before you performed the autopsy, did you check for a pulse?"

Witness: "No."

DA: "Did you check for blood pressure?"

Witness: "No."

DA: "Did you check for breathing?"

Witness: "No."

DA: "So, then it is possible that the patient was alive when you began the autopsy?"

Witness: "No."

DA: "How can you be so sure, doctor?"

Witness: "Because his brain was sitting on my desk in a jar." **DA:** "But could the patient have still been alive, nevertheless?" **Witness:** "Yes, it is possible that he could have been alive and asking questions in a courtroom somewhere."

With my apologies to all of the amazing attorneys I know, I provide this

introduction to illustrate that sometimes there is a ducking of a question in the answers that we provide. We've also seen a lot of duck and weave with all of the presidential candidate's town hall meetings and debates, too. But ultimately we sense it in the post-resurrection appearance of Jesus when Peter duck's the Master's inquiry, "Do you love me?"

I used to think that I could turn on my TV at almost any time of day and see the question ducking on Law and Order. We've learned the lingo and until shows like this most of us didn't have a clue what "exculpatory evidence" was. We now have a better idea about what constitutes an especially "heinous" crime. We can surmise when a witness is being "badgered" and testimony is merely "hearsay." We may have even fooled and convinced ourselves that TV has prepared us to be our own attorneys with the abilities of Jack "Hang 'Em High" McCoy., Perry Mason, Elsbeth Tascioni (The Good Wife), Ben Matlock, Saul Goodman (Breaking Bad) or Denny Crane (Boston Legal). Their cases are usually wrapped up in about an hour with stunning confessions.

Courts are rarely like this. They are generally far more boring and repetitive, and a lot of the arguing and resolves takes place behind closed doors. We rarely get that "You can't handle the truth!" moment from a witness. In fact, when witnesses do appear in court, they often fail to answer the attorney's questions altogether. Witnesses can be so notoriously unable or unwilling to answer the question that there's a whole lexicon of phrases that lawyers (both TV lawyers and real attorneys) use to request the judge to force the witness to give a definitive response.

My target in this month's article isn't really attorneys at all, but witnesses. "Objection! Non-responsive!" is the line used by a lawyer when a witness is ducking the question. There are plenty of ways to duck a question with a non-answer and answering a question with a question may be good for a classroom but not a courtroom. We are pretty good loophole locators. Even Peter tried it when encountered his risen Lord by the Sea of Galilee. After Jesus death, Peter went back to fishing. Jesus appeared there according to John 21 and asked, "Peter do you love me?" Actually in Greek we read it, "Peter do you agape me?" (Agape – faithful, unconditional commitment that is self-sacrificing and value creating). Peter's answer is, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love (Phileo) you. (Phileo – to value and love like a brother – Philadelphia, the City of Brotherly Love)

Jesus was not Tevye seeking a response from Golde, "Golde, do you love me?" Jesus wasn't trying to ascertain a romantic expression and feeling from Peter.

After breakfast, in the gospel of John Jesus took a deposition of sorts. "Simon, son of John," Jesus asks, "do you love me more than these?" These disciples? These fish that have just been caught? Actually we will find that Jesus asked the question three times that go sort of like this.

- 1) Peter do you agape me?
- 2) Yes Lord, you know that I phileo you.
- 1)Peter do you agape me?
- 2)Yes Lord, you know that I phileo you.
- 1) Peter do you phileo me?
- 2) Yes, Lord, you know that I philieo you.

How wonderful it would have been if Peter had quit ducking and his third answer would have been, "Yes, Lord, you know that I agape you. Peter stepped down from the stand. It seems as if his answer wasn't quite what Jesus had hoped, but our Lord found it enough to start a ministry and then commanded the disciple, "Feed my lambs!"

We are in post resurrection mode now and waiting for Pentecost. But as we awaken to the newness of spring, may we come alive to the hopeful assurance that even in our dodging and ducking, God has found enough faith in our Lenten and Eastertide journey a seed of faith from which ministry and mission can grow. May God provide enough rain and sunshine and this pastor just enough Sunday manure, to help the seeds sprout and flourish.



ONLINE GIVING FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Why is the church offering this service?

Use of credit/debit cards and online purchasing are becoming more popular, as check usage declines. Online giving is much more convenient than preparing and bringing/mailing checks to church. The contributions are instantaneous and you get email confirmation.

How do I make donations?

Through the church website: http://www.pittsfordpres.org click on the "Giving" link at the top of the page, then click "Give Online Now". You will be directed to a Donation page.

You may make a one-time contribution or set up a secure account with a user name and password to simplify future donations (and you will have instant access to your contribution history). Recurring donations can be set up for any amount and any frequency and can be modified by you at any time. Ease of payment also helps members budget their contributions throughout the year.

What donations may I make?

You may make a pledge or offering contribution for our annual budget, a Special Offering, Memorial gift, or designate a contribution or payment to any fund raising activity or mission event. Literally any contribution or payment you currently make to the church by check can be done electronically.

How do I pay?

You may elect to have funds transferred from a checking/savings account or by a debit/credit card payment.

Is it secure?

The payment process meets the strictest standards set by the payment card industry. Within the church, only the Financial Administrator has access to your payment information, and you will continue to receive a quarterly statement detailing all contributions/payments to the church.

Is there a cost?

There is no cost to the donor. The church incurs a nominal charge for checking/savings contributions and a 3% fee for debit/credit card payments. You have the option of increasing your contribution to cover the card fee. To minimize church expense, it would be helpful if large donations were made by check.

Who provides the service?

We have contracted with Vanco Payment Solutions; a leader in nonprofit and church payment systems in business for 17 years with over 30,000 clients. Visit their website: http://vancopayments.com/

How does the church benefit?

We no longer have to process your paper checks (bank bill pay programs also send us paper checks). This saves time and is more secure...and better for the environment!! Members making recurring contributions help smooth out our cash flow. Churches have also found that ease of giving often results in an increase in giving.


