Kids are not good at waiting. Neither are adults for the most part, but let's stick with the kids for now.

Waiting for the pediatrician at the doctor's office. Waiting their turn to play with their favorite toy at school. Waiting with us at the DMV for our number to be called. Waiting and asking from the backseat of the car, "Are we there yet?" Most children struggle with wait-
ing, but frankly, so do most adults.

During Advent the waiting becomes intensified. Worse than any long line at the store, is waiting for the cookies to cool before we can ice them and sample them and have pictures taken with Santa. Children muddle

through the last few days of school, waiting for Christmas break to start and then they suffer through traffic and travel delay before arriving at Grandma's house. All this is in addition to the most difficult wait of all—waiting for the big day to arrive.

My hope was to give thought to uncover what some "experts" might advise for teaching children about developing patience with the hope that I might find something for the adults who just might read some of this. Timers? Modeling patience?

Well, little of this is new. James wrote a letter to a church struggling to wait in the first century. His missive is in the Bible. He sent it to a church struggling to wait. In James 5:7-10 he uses the word, "patience" four times. "Be patient until the coming of the Lord," he writes, reminding the people for what they are waiting.



As we have endured this election cycle both Republicans and Democrats have listened to predictions about the arrival of the *eschaton*. It has been described as a foreshadowing apocalypse. Each party predicted dire consequences and catastrophe should the opposing party win the election. This is not new. Over the years we have heard predictions by televangelists, the ancient Mayans, politicians, books and movies. Most of their dates have come and gone. The world has not come to an end. Jesus has not yet returned. And we are still here, waiting patiently.

We may not feel the urgency the early church felt about the return of Jesus. We do know, however, that there have been times when we have prayed for Jesus to act in our lives and he seemed to delay giving a response. In the hospital room, at the nursing home, or in the middle of the night wrestling with that problem, we have prayed for Jesus to bring healing for our family members, strength to our friends, or peace to our lives. We have cried out from the depths of our hearts, "Please, Jesus, don't be late."

WikiHow, a website that claims to be the place where one can "learn how to do anything," offers tips and advice on a wide variety of topics. At wikiHow.com, you can learn how to alleviate back pain, breed canaries, and write a screenplay.

A section of the website titled "Christmas for Kids" contains articles on how to write a letter to Santa, snoop for your Christmas presents without your parents finding out, and draw baby Jesus. One story even gives advice on how to wait for Christmas morning.

Many of the suggestions wikiHow gives involve being distracted. They recommend tiring yourself out before going to bed on Christmas Eve, reading a book, listening to music, making lists and writing in a journal. The idea is to occupy your mind with something other than Christmas. If you focus on something other than the day to come and try to do things as you do them on every other day, the hours will pass more quickly.

Other suggestions, however, encourage children to do just the opposite. Rather than trying to forget that Christmas is coming, they're advised to enter more fully into Advent, to count down the days with an Advent calendar. These ideas include helping Mom and Dad with Christmas preparations like wrapping gifts, decorating, baking, and getting Santa's snack ready. These activities not only pass the time, but they involve the child in the preparation. The New Testament writer of James had some suggestions, too. They included:

- + Don't grumble about one another.
- + Don't complain about your brothers and sisters.
- + Be patient by loving and caring for one another.

One of my "memory triggers" to think about patience has been "The Chipmunks Song," which has made it to the airwaves every December since Alvin and his bud-

dies first appeared in 1958. Long after any kid has wanted a plane that loops the loop or a hula hoop for Christmas, Alvin, Simon, and Theodore's cry, "We can hardly stand the wait. Please, Christmas, don't be late!" is a cry that remains relevant.

Inwardly I know that my frenzy is useless and that I am trying to squirm out of the present into the future. Patience makes us ache with boredom. It speaks of self-control, restraint, delayed gratification. What is less fun? Impulsivity, intensity, drama—now we're talking! But after years of twisting and burning in the fires of impatience, I've come to appreciate that an application of patience can cool outrage and bring peace. That is something we need more often than at Christmas.

This summer, while waiting for vacation to arrive, I clipped out an idea from Amy Gross who wrote on Oprah.com. She said, "Patience is a skill, not an inherited trait I happened not to inherit. It leads to relaxation, not self-harnessing. It gives you the freedom to have a pleasant time even when the traffic gods are playing with you. It converts the helpless rage of impatience into a delicious sense of spaciousness."

If I interpret her thinking for December I think she was saying, "Let's cool our jets! Let's make the main thing the main thing! Let's remember that pregnancy for people usually takes about nine months." Let's make another cup of hot chocolate, take a nap, and embrace the coming winter and the joy of God's incarnation.


News from the Nursery School

Outreach is pleased to welcome the refugee family from Syria we are supporting. After much excited anticipation, we met the family of nine early in November. They arrived in early October, after a stay in a refugee camp in Turkey. The five daughters range in age from 18 to 8 months old, and two sons are 16 and 7. They are a beautiful family, full of love and gratitude!



Our first objective is to find the best way to communicate, as their only language is Arabic and Turkish. Google Translate has allowed us to understand each other at a very minimal level, so please let us know if you would be interested in translating. We have enjoyed our visits to their home, where they greeted us in English (“How do you do?” and “Nice to meet you”). We brought games and sang simple songs with the children, who seemed to love the interaction. We also used RTS to go to the Public Market, which was a learning experience for all of us!

I will keep you posted on our interactions and progress as time goes on. In the meantime, the family does not have a stroller or a market basket on wheels, which would be extremely helpful, as they do not have a car, and must either walk or take a bus to the grocery store. 
