preciative Inquiry process to drive essential components of the Mission Study. The Appreciative Inquiry process will do more than simply 'jump through the hoops' of completing a mission study. It will do much, much more. It will shape our conversations, orient our congregational culture, and guide us as we discover who is God calling us to be and where does God want us to go.

Al emerged more than 30 years ago as an alternative to problem-based approaches for organizational transformation. All is future-oriented and focuses on congregational assets, core competencies and strengths. It engages the entire congregation in conversation about our greatest experiences; core values; highest hopes and aspirations for the church. It is an approach to organizational change that shifts the focus of the church culture from deficits to assets, the past to the future, finger-pointing to collaboration, and solving problems to sparking possibilities... It intentionally incorporates consultation with all members and therefore seeks to involve the entire congregation.

One of the goals is to hear from everyone either through small group gatherings or an interview process. The more who are involved – the better it will be. The commitment is to provide everyone with a voice, to make sure everyone is heard. It is a significant, but worthy task. If you would like to assist with steering the mission study process with this methodology, the Nominating Committee via Betsy Wilson is collecting names for Session approval. While existing documents and other data collecting instruments play a role in the journey ahead, (and they will be utilized) an Appreciative Inquiry process will be our congregational focus through the days of Lent. Our inquiry will be redirected from 'are we there yet?' to the generative, life-giving aspects of this beloved faith community and where God wants it to be.

We all look forward to a meaningful, fun, fulfilling time of discernment, dialogue, discovery, dreaming, designing, and delivery. No, we are not there yet; but, half the fun is getting there! Let's make this our traveler's prayer:

Mighty God - Rarely do we know what lies at journey's end,

Yet we are called—

from the dark mysteries of the present and invited to journey forward in faith. It is no easy task; for who would care to venture forth in that which is not known? ...

Texas Mission Trip for Hurricane Harvey Reconstruction

Members from First Pres Pittsford—Ron Pollock, Bev Pollock, Adam Pollock, Leah Preston (Ron's sister), Jim Bishop, and Bob Klie—went to Texas. Jim's brother John Bishop also came from Houston to work with us for several days. We stayed at the First Baptist Church of Vidor Texas, near Beaumont which is about two hours NE of Houston. In addition to those of us from NY and TX staying at First Baptist were groups from California, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Louisiana, and Florida; there were over 35 people in all the during the week.

We left early Monday, New Year's Day, and got there early enough to get a couple of hours work in. We worked through Friday at the home of Willie and Donna Kountz in Lumberton TX, near Beaumont, which is about two hours NE of Houston. Willie and Donna were some of the nicest people you'd ever meet. They worked right alongside of us every day. Our work included dry wall spackling of their entire house. Willie and Donna had hung most of the dry wall themselves and we got the taping and spackling mostly completed. Donna made lunch for us every day and also invited other groups working on homes nearby. They are very special people and we felt blessed to be able to get to know them and work with them.

On Saturday we hung dry wall to get a facility ready to host more volunteers. The Houston area is just at the beginning of their recovery efforts which will take years.

Treasurer's Report

Preliminary 2017 year end results show income equal to expenses. We anticipated a \$50,000 income shortfall. However, Music Director and Pastor vacancies contributed to reduced expenses. 2018 Stewardship commitments totaled \$543,000; a reduction of \$63,000 from the 2017 Campaign. We are most grateful for these commitments, yet experience shows congregations undergoing pastoral transition often experience a temporary 10-15% reduction in giving. Planning for 2018 anticipates similar expenses as 2017 except with a full staff. Lower contributions and normal expense levels combine to project an income shortfall in excess of \$100,000 for the 2018 budget. This amount will be funded with \$40,000 from prior year unused Endowment distributions as well as planned \$60,000 from the 2018 Endowment distribution. In response, we will focus congregation involvement toward increasing our annual giving; an element of our larger pastoral search selfassessment. Because our congregation has demonstrated its generosity time and again, we are confident the resources for which we have been good stewards to date, in combination with anticipated gifts, will enable the continued spread of God's good news locally, nationally and internationally.

RAIHN - Program of Hope

Volunteers from faith communities throughout the Rochester area provide homeless families with an evening meal and a safe (and warm!) place to sleep each night for 1 week, 4 times per year. All of us here at First Presbyterian are hosts!! We share our space with others who are in need! As the new year begins, I am looking back at the last year of volunteering for RAIHN. There have been a number of times when I smiled with a warm feeling in my heart.

Here's one example that I observed. For the Advent season, Craig arranged for an unbreakable nativity scene to be put on a table in the foyer for children to touch. As guests waited, I noticed one of the young boys from a RAIHN family standing in front of the scene and looking at it very reverently. After a few minutes, he gently lifted the baby Jesus in manger and rocked it carefully in his little hands. I wondered what he was thinking. Did he see himself in the baby whose family also had difficulty finding a safe, warm, and quiet place to stay? After a few minutes, he laid the ba-



by and manger down and went back upstairs to the shelter we, as a church, provided for his family and 4 other families for the week.

Another volunteer from our support congregation, Christ Episcopal, told me about this. She and her husband volunteered to be around for RAIHN guests on a Saturday evening. At one point, a young mother and her daughter came out of their room and walked down the hall to the kitchen to make hot chocolate. They carried it to the table where we (the volunteers) were sitting and a conversation began. At one point I said that it was too bad they had to gather up everything and move to another church the next day. She said it was something of a hassle, but that RAIHN was such a blessing, being in even a women's a shelter with a young child was a very difficult experience. It was always noisy, sometimes scary, there wasn't the wide range of support a volunteer-run program was able to provide. Best of all, RAIHN gave her a sense of home, with something as simple as snacks in the kitchen and people to listen.

At another time, a guest commented that she "loved the chicken and mushrooms" served the previous evening. She was asked if she wanted some of the leftovers - and she replied, "we already ate them all up!"

I can't help but mention just a few of the volunteers who are so faithful in giving to RAIHN. Jan Buhlmann helps with supplies for set up, Lee Fox willingly stays overnight, so do Daniel Traina and Debbie Matrachisia faithfully, Judy and John Messenger stock the upstairs kitchen and often fill in wherever needed, and Jeff and Julie Steele help with set up and take down. And many more!!

I am so thankful for the opportunity that RAIHN has provided for me to give to others - and I gain more than I give every time! Are you called to volunteer with RAIHN? It can be as little as giving a couple of hours to "host" guests in the evening or helping prepare the evening meal. But you will be giving hope!


