Now I really don't have anything against Boston, but I have learned through the internet and magazines that only seem to linger around Doctors' waiting rooms, that Boston still has a few very strange traffic laws its books. So here are several of those coupled with suggestions for driving in Boston from the Boston Globe:



- When on a one-way street, stay to the right to allow oncoming traffic to pass.
- Never, ever, stop for a pedestrian unless he flings himself under the wheels of your car.
- The first parking space you see will be the last parking space you see. Grab it.
- Never get in the way of a car that needs extensive bodywork.
- Always look both ways when running a red light.
- Never use directional signals when changing lanes. They only warn other drivers to speed up and not let you in.
- Making eye contact revokes your right of way.
- Is Boston the only place in our great land where such traffic advice is either legal or advised? Well certainly not!
- In Little Rock, Arkansas, "no person shall sound the horn on a vehicle at any place where cold drinks or sandwiches are served after 9 p.m."
- For decades it was illegal for a woman to drive down Main Street in Waynesboro, Virginia, without her husband walking in front of the vehicle waving a red flag.
- In Montana, it's illegal to leave a sheep unescorted in a truck.
- Tennessee has a law that prohibits shooting at animals from a car, unless that animal happens to be a whale. If you see a whale on the side of the road in, say, Chattanooga then, by all means, blast away.
- In San Francisco, car wash owners are restricted from drying off vehicles with used underwear. Now what do you suppose initiated this statue? Weird traffic laws have always been a part of American culture, but, in John's gospel, the best rules of the road are those that lead us straight to Jesus.

Traffic laws in Jesus' day were a whole lot less stringent and weird since most people of the poorer classes traveled by foot (as did sheep, by the way). Jesus may have walked thousands of miles in his lifetime, all without ever honking a horn or making a left on red. But, as he traveled, he began to define a different set of rules for those who would follow him on those ancient roads and for those of us who follow him today.

Here at the beginning of a New Yea, after having just read from the gospel of John those usual verses from chapter 1 on Christmas, I thought that it might be good to take my time to read through the entire gospel in the month of January. Since John has 21 chapters, I could take the weekends off (Saturday and Sunday) and still make it through the whole book. The story seems to open with Jesus on the road from the place of his baptism (likely on the Jordan River near the Dead Sea) back to Galilee, his home territory. The road running along the Jordan was the main north-south route through the region, and Jesus and his people would have traversed it many times. But on this journey home he had a few new road rule and we see it before we get out of the first chapter:

Rule #1: FOLLOW. "Follow me" (v. 43). This first rule is the equivalent of Jesus holding up a red flag and waving it in front of those who would come after him. Note that it's said in the imperative — not a suggestion or a request but a command. It's not simply "think about me" or "consider me." It's "follow me." To be a disciple of Jesus is to leave the route you were on and take a narrow, one-way road behind him which might take us all down some unique highways in 2015.

John opens with Jesus calling disciples. Jesus is acting relationally here rather than legalistically. His instruction is not "Here is how you must live." His first words are, "Follow me."

John Buchanan, writing in Christian Century (March 20, 2012), says: "Jesus did not ask Peter, James and John to subscribe to a set of theological propositions, nor did he want them to feel anything. He asked them to follow, to decide to get up from what they were doing and go with him."

Some will hope that in 2015 someone will hand them "certainty" to be accepted on a blind platter. That is not what following Jesus means. In 2015 maybe following Jesus will be a time for us to discover the curious connection between the way we think and the way we bond. If could be a time for us to engage in mission, to sacrifice a snippet of convenience to make the world better, to discipline ourselves to worship or deepen our faith by engaging in ministry or fellowship. If you think that framing life's issues in black-and-white, either/or, on-and-off alternatives is following Jesus, your path will lack resiliency. [My thinking about this paragraph was needled by the writing of Edwin H. Friedman, *Friedman's Fables* (Guilford Press, 2014), 112.]

I say, "Let's follow Jesus in 2015!" He is the way! There are lots of suggestions in this month's *Good News* to begin the journey!

# **Sunday School Studies Mission**



#### PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN



### **OPTIMISTS** ~ Program: Mary Jewett Telford—Civil War Nurse

As the Civil War raged, Mary Jewett Telford fought her own battle to become a nurse to the soldiers. Despite being turned away by Dorothea Dix and the U.S. Sanitary Commission, she persevered and was commissioned a nurse at Hospital No. 8 in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1883 she became a charter member of the Woman's Relief Corps., an organization dedicated to aiding Civil War soldiers and their families. She supported her husband, who had been severely wounded at the Battle of Stone's River, by writing short stories and traveling the country speaking for temperance. Her courage and determination for service to others was ended only by her death in 1906, but her legacy lives on. She was nominated for the National Women's Hall of Fame in 2010.
