This song describes a need for some Hydrochromatic Hope which is ultimately the theme of this article. Here we sit on the official gateway to summer, with its dash of color and heat. Is it just me or was the winter not severe, but long? Has it not felt like an endless barrage of cloudy, grey days this spring? More so than usual for upstate New York? Maybe that is why is why I was attracted to a news story about artists from SAIC (School of the Art Institute of Chicago). They developed urban art ideas including sidewalk murals, visible only when it rains. My grand-daughters use sidewalk chalk, and create murals Picasso looking murals on our driveway that disappear when it rains. I don't suggest that we send out platoons of painters to embolden the sidewalks of Pittsford, but something a bit hydrochromatic may be what we need to-day.

By all accounts, Seoul, Korea, is a great place to live, and one of the most visited cities on the planet. It is a modernized metropolis with amenities. There is a wonderful public transportation system, easy access to great parks, enjoyable food and magnificent weather in the spring and fall. The weather in their summer, however, is less than desirable. It rains nearly as many days as it doesn't and this is only before the monsoon season when things become really dismal – days of drab, dreary grays that weigh on one's soul – in Seoul.

This affects disposition and mood with something professionals call SAD (Seasonal Affective Disorder). But, what if there was a way to bring color and joy into lives so that "The Blahs" could be mitigated by the grey pall of dark clouds? On sidewalks, streets, crosswalks and alleyways the artists from SAIC painted colorful murals with hydrochromatic paint. They painted a giant pink whale surrounded by fish of many shapes, sizes and brilliant colors. They all appear to be swimming down the street together with the pedestrians. On an alley walkway, they painted a team of colorful tortoises.

They incorporated brilliant blues, pinks, yellows, reds, purples and greens that when heads are bent down in "depression" spirits can be lifted in contrast to gray sky. Most of the time the murals are invisible. But hydrochromatic paint becomes visible when activated by water. In other words, these beautiful works of art are only visible when it rains! Joy peeks through the sadness when dreaded storms are foreboding. Playfulness replaces despair and it happens, not in spite of the rain, but because of it.

In New York, it is the winter that brings us SAD. Normally the summer is more uplifting, but there events that find our souls in monsoon season most any time - ailing bodies, broken relationships, tight finances, boring jobs and general feelings of dissatisfaction with our day-to-day existence can do it.

In the Old Testament there is an account of Naaman who appears to have everything going for him. He is a high-ranking general in the army of Aram, well-regarded by his king and the people. But Naaman develops a skin disease and all his skill in battle are useless against it. He becomes desperate. With a servant girl's advice and cash he heads to Israel where he gets little respect. Nobles shuffle him off to Elisha's place which is not a state-of-the-art dermatology clinic. His heart sinks.

Even Elisha's medical approach feels disrespectful but at the height of his frustration Naaman reluctantly agreed to follow the prescription of Elisha. You can discover this tale in 2 Kings, not the most thrilling beach read, but the books of 1 and 2 Kings have some fascinating tales

for post-memorial day thinking.



Naaman's healing in the story is hydrochromatic. He is told to bathe in the Jordan 7 times. But the power for healing was not in the water. Like the rain on the streets of Seoul activating the paint, the water of the Jordan makes visible what had previously gone unnoticed, but had been there all along, that God was with him.

The apostle Paul makes a similar point in 2 Corinthians 12:9. "But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me" (NIV).

This is a difficult paradox: Our weakest moments may also become the moments of our greatest strength! It is then that others see in us we might all miss - grace, strength, courage and faith. We sometimes wield our greatest power not sending a text or issuing directives by email, but by modeling the persuasive power of a life of inner character revealed by the rain.

June usually brings great joy of light, but if you want a different experience, on one of these warm June days, with a heavy summer rain, put on your swimsuit. Don't worry about how you look, you aren't going to model it on the beach. Don't worry about hair, or make-up. You might want flip-flops. Then, go out in the rain, and feel the hydrochromatic love that God can bring. You will be all wet, but refreshed, because you have let a bit of childhood innocence to erupt anew.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Church Finances ~ Through April, our receipts exceeded expenses by \$11,000 including a planned \$15,000 distribution from Endowment to supplement current giving. Pledge contributions are on budget while non pledged offerings and back pledge contributions are slightly behind budget. Expenses are \$17,000 below budget. This is primarily driven by lower building expense due to mild weather, energy conservation savings, and the absence of significant building repairs.




End of Year is Fast Approaching If you see a youth in passing or on Sunday morning, don't forget that they are starting to worry about end of the year. Ask them how they're doing and


PENNY PINCHER SALE WISH LIST~ As you clean out, reorganize or downsize in the next few months, please keep this list in mind.
