If April showers bring May flowers, what do May flowers bring? The Kindergarten answer is "Mayflowers bring Pilgrims." Yes, I know that this is the May Good News, but I'm actually writing this in April and at the moment, I've been seeing lots of grey sky, much rain and drizzle, and thinking a lot about May flowers. My mind then makes all kinds of goofy connections like, "Was it a rainy April when Noah got the message from God to build the



ark? So let's go there . . . to the ark. I think about Noah's Ark most every day since there is carved ark sitting on my desk that was purchased in Kenya. The carver made the animals and placed them inside. At one time I collected lots of statements about the ark like, "Noah was floating his stock while everyone else was in liquidation."

Back in 1976 Hollywood released to theaters the movie, *In Search of Noah's Ark*. At the time pastors were deluged (well sort of) with questions since many who saw the film got the impression that Noah's ark had definitely been found. Particularly memorable was a fuzzy telephoto photograph of what some thought might be the ark. However, later expeditions proved that the object was simply a large rock formation.

Then in the 1980s and '90s, many were misled by network news stories and newspaper articles that claimed the ark had been found at a completely different location. Reports were of a ship-shaped structure 15 miles from Mount Ararat. Unfortunately, various exaggerated claims about this site were spread. This location is often referred to as the Durupinar Site. It was internationally promoted by an American nurse-anesthetist Ron Wyatt, who was known for making inaccurate claims. Geologic surveys, subsurface radar and core-drilling data later confirmed beyond any doubt that this odd formation was not the ark. It is merely a geologic feature common throughout the Ararat region. There are tons of lessons to learn about God's commands, Noah's obedience, divine displeasure, and ultimate promises that come to mind every time we see a rainbow.

We have the Biblical details in Genesis chapters 5-10. Almost every culture on Earth includes an ancient flood story. Details vary, but the basic plot is the similar: torrents of water destroy all but a lucky few.

- Older than Genesis is the Babylonian epic of Gilgamesh, a king who embarked on a journey to find the secret of immortality. Along the way, he met Utnapishtim, survivor of a great flood sent by the gods. Warned by Enki, the water god, Utnapishtim built a boat and saved his family and friends, along with artisans, animals and precious metals.
- Ancient Greeks and Romans grew up with the story of Deucalion and Pyhrra, who saved their children and a collection of animals by boarding a vessel shaped like a giant box.

- Irish legends talk about Queen Cesair and her court, who sailed for seven years to avoid drowning when the oceans overwhelmed Ireland.
- European explorers in the Americas were startled by native legends that sounded similar to the story of Noah. Some Spanish priests feared the devil had planted such stories in their minds to confuse them. (Robert Ballard's Search of the Evidence of Noah's Flood," *National Geographic*, 2004).

So, pulling together a number of analysis let us consider what would happen if Noah built the ark in Pittsford in 2016.

The Lord spoke to Noah and said, "In six months I'm going to make it rain until the whole earth is covered with water. Evil people will be saved. But I want to save some good folks and two of every kind of living thing on the planet. I am ordering you to build an ark.

In a flash of lightning the Lord delivered the specifications. "Ok," said Noah. Six months later it started to rain. The Lord saw that Noah was sitting in his front yard, not far from Rand Place in Pittsford. He was weeping and there was no ark.

"Noah," shouted the Lord, "Where is my Ark?"

"Lord please forgive me," Noah begged. "I did my best. There were big problems. First I had to get a building permit for the Ark construction project and your plans didn't meet village code. So I had to hire an engineer to redraw the plans. Then I got into a big fight over whether or not the Ark needed a fire sprinkler system recommended by the Town Fire Marshall. My neighbors objected, claiming I was violating zoning restrictions by building the Ark in my front yard. I had a visit from the Parking Monitor who gave me a ticket. He suggested that I would also need a variance from the Village Architectural Review Board and the Village Planning Commission who said that the Ark didn't comply with the Erie Canal Improvement Plan. Furthermore he handed me a community event form to be completed and filed with the Village Clerk.

It was a real challenge to get enough gopher wood for the Ark. There was a ban on cutting trees to save the Spotted Owl. I had to convince U.S. Fish and Wildlife that I needed the wood to save the owls. However, there is a ban on collecting owls, so there will be no owls on the Ark. Members of the Carpenters Union from the city arrived and began picketing the construction project. They prevented any supplies from being delivered by Rochester Lumber. I had to negotiate a settlement with the National Labor Relations Board before anyone was permitted to pick up a saw or a hammer. Now we have 16 carpenters going on the boat and still now owls.

I started to gather animals beginning with a pair of deer that we tracked and caught near Mendon Ponds, but I was abruptly sued by an animal rights group. They objected to me taking only two of each kind. We got the suit dismissed, but then the EPA notified me that I couldn't complete the Ark without an Environmental Impact Statement on your proposed flood. They didn't take kindly to the idea that they had no jurisdiction over the conduct of a Supreme Being. Then the Army Corps of Engineers requested a map of the proposed new flood plain. I gave them a globe.

I thought that we were pretty well set, but had a visit today wanting to know if the Ark Construction had anything to do with the proposed Westport Crossing Apartment Complex.

Currently I'm still trying to resolve a complaint from the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the Immigration Service who are fearful that some of the carpenters are undocumented immigrants. The IRS has seized all my assets claiming I'm trying to avoid paying taxes by leaving the country and probably am trying to sail down the canal, the Hudson and on to Panama. Just today I got a new boat use tax for the Finger Lakes to help manage the aquatic hydrilla infestation of lake weeds.

Lord, I think it is going to be minimally another five years before I will get your Ark finished.



Currently, Shoulder to Shoulder operates 7 primary health centers, Women's health care, Dentistry, and a bilingual school. Our work will be split between one of Shoulder to Shoulder Medical Clinic's in Santa Lucia, Intibuca and their Good Shepherd bilingual school in Camasca Intibuca.

While in Santa Lucia we will be completing construction projects that will vary between concrete repair, painting, cleaning and installing/repairing water collection system. When we arrive in Camasca, we will split our days between working with the kids at the school and the other half of the day we will attend to the school's construction needs.

Others need assistance because of inadequate fixed incomes, a disability or uninsured medical bills, single parenthood or an increase in household size.

In 2015, the PFC served 9,476 people through the tireless work of over 100 volunteers. The PFC has a variety of flexible volunteer programs that make it easy for members of the community, adults and young people, to get involved and to volunteer as a group or an individual. 
Youth Triennium 2016



STEPHEN MINISTRY ~ CHRIST CARING FOR PEOPLE





Refugee Companions

Each year the United States admits thousands of refugees without hope for a peaceful return to their homeland. Catholic Family Center (CFC) Refugee Resettlement programs help settle refugees upon their arrival in the United States, providing a broad set of services such as airport reception, assistance securing housing and accessing medical, educational, employment and public benefit agency services.

What is a Refugee Companioning Team?

Refugee Companioning Teams are volunteers from congregations, businesses social or other groups who provide support for refugee families. The team is connected to a newly-arrived refugee family, and the support provided builds upon the resettlement services of Catholic Family Center (CFC) refugee resettlement staff.

What are the specific obligations of being a team volunteers?

Some examples of the different ways that teams provide help include the following: **Home Set-up -** setting up the refugee's home or apartment - putting together beds & arrange furnishings.

English Language – providing afterschool tutoring to refugee children and adults **Home Economics** – assisting with grocery shopping; helping manage a household budget

Visiting the family in their home – see how they live, what their needs may be and discuss these with the CFC case manager

Cultural Orientation - helping the family in their efforts to understand the nuances of American culture such as public safety issues, personal hygiene practices or standards of child supervision

Community Navigation - showing them bus routes or how to get around the city to places they may need to go; introducing them to recreational and cultural facilities; helping them connect to their own ethnic community within Rochester; assisting them in obtaining library cards and internet access.

There is no financial obligation and the average length of commitment is approximately six months from the refugee family's date of arrival. Second language skills are not necessary.
