Upon reflection Freddie realized that he could never keep that promise and so he tossed the letter into the wastepaper basket and with his 1st grade print wrote, "Dear Jesus, if I get a red wagon for Christmas, I will eat all my vegetables for a year." When he checked with his Mom about how to spell "vegetables" it occurred to him that these would include broccoli.

This was a Catholic family and so Freddie took the family statue of the Virgin Mary that sat on the right side of the mantel in the family room. He stuffed the statue in an old gym bag and shoved the bag into the rear of his closet.

"Dear Jesus," he began a third time, "If you ever want to see your mother again . . . "

This story has been around for a long time, but so have the concepts of bribery and ransom. Did you know that multi-lettered, glued-together ransom notes are really more Hollywood than history? In the most infamous kidnapping cases (like the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby and Patty Hearst), we discover that high profile ransom notes were handwritten, hastily scrawled for maximum impact.

But, in 2015 ransom notes may be about our computers as much as they are about us. Criminals know that our data is important to us. It isn't just people about which we care. A new generation of digital kidnappers now abducts data through sneaky infiltrating malware. They then demand a ransom from the computer's owner before releasing back the control of the data.

This abusive "ransomware" is a major new crime in our digitally connected world. You innocently visit a website or receive an email that looks informatively harmless. But attached is the ransomware virus that infects your computer's operating system. The

ransomware makes your data inaccessible to you. Pop-up messages bring false hope that for \$25 (or \$500 sometimes), payable by credit card or bitcoin you can have control returned. This is malware of the worst kind. It is cyber kidnapping.

It occurs to me that not only are our computers infected with "viruses" so are our lives. We feel like we are held captive by our sinful behaviors until a ransom is paid and our consciences relieved and Christians learn that Jesus is the ransom. Payment of the ransom then presents us with the paradox of gratitude.

Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all." This is a different perspective for political candidates eyeing polls. Followers of Jesus do not hold others hostage to their ambition and personal gain. Instead, they give of themselves in service of others. It's the paradoxical economics of Jesus: You only gain when you give away.

Don't think so? Check out 1 Timothy 2:5-6 or 1 Corinthians 6:20

In God's eyes, we are all stars. God promised Abraham descendants as numerous as the stars (Genesis 22:17) and we have been gifted to reflect God's light to the world. One way adults and children can respond to all that God has given us is during the offering. Now children can fill out a "Children's Offering" sheet located in the Worship Tote.


This form directs children to think of creative ways they can help God in the coming week. Could they help their teacher at school, reach out to someone new, try to be nice to a sibling, or look for those in need?

ALL STARS★ GENEROSITY TEAM

George Washington's original pencil sketch for the flag indicated 6-pointed stars, a form he apparently preferred. Betsy Ross, however, said that correct heraldry required a 5-pointed star. When Washington and his committee protested that it was too difficult to make, she took a piece of paper, folded it deftly, and with a single snip of her scissors, produced a symmetrical five-pointed star. This seeming feat of magic so impressed her audience that they readily agreed to her suggestion. Take a thin piece of paper 8-1/2" x 10" (or an exact proportion thereof), fold it as indicated and cut yourself a perfect 5-pointed star.

Fold a piece of paper in half (an 8 1/2 inch by 10 inch rectangle will work - just cut off the lower inch of a piece of standard typing paper). Write the letters "A", "B", "C" and fold here "M" on it as shown in the picture. "A" and "C" are the edges along the fold. "M" is the mid-point of "A" and "C"; "B" is the vertical mid-point of the folded paper. Fold corner "A" to point "B." Mark the newly-formed corner B "D." C Fold corner "C" over the paper edge running from "B" to "D" (along the dotted line). Make another fold along the dotted line D-C. Cut the paper along a line from a point near one edge to a point about halfway to the point "D" (the dotted line cut 🚽 illustrated on the left). Unfold the paper and you will have a star.

BACKPACK MINISTRY - IT'S FOR THE KIDS! ~ We are now in our third school year of helping children in our community get the food and nourishment they need on the weekends when they are not in school. We have been working with School 54 in Rochester to reach a number of kids that are considered at "extreme risk of hunger" and, without help, likely would go hungry on Saturday and Sunday. Most of these children are identified as homeless and range in age from 5 to 13 years old. We intend to help 40 - 45 children this year.



We have been blessed with a number of wonderful people in our congregation who have helped a great deal over the past three years

by donating time, effort, money and food to help us reach these needy children. A number of other churches and senior organizations as well as the good folks at Wegmans Food Markets have also helped a great deal. Unfortunately, the problem does not go away (the city of Rochester is now #2 in the <u>country</u> – behind only Detroit - in terms of childhood poverty rate – 55%+).

We need food (or money) and occasional volunteers -

Prepared pasta meals or boxes of macaroni and cheese are especially needed. Ten dollars can buy 12 boxes of mac and cheese or 10 cans of Chef Boyardee ravioli (there is a blue box in fellowship hall for your donations).

Alternatively, if you prefer, you may give or mail a check to Cesca or Doris in the church office made out to our church and they will ensure it is used immediately and specifically for the program.

Volunteers to occasionally pack the packs or deliver to the school are also appreciated (if you can volunteer contact Dave Testa at dtesta@rochester.rr.com).

Regardless of how you help, we know it will make a difference in the lives of these children. It not only helps to fill their tummies, it shows them that there are those that love them and care about them – feelings that can cause all kinds of good things to happen in their lives.


