A WEE WORD FROM DR. WEENINK

PRES—<u>PAR</u>—TERIANISM: Overcoming the Law of Averages

As these words are being penned, there is a shroud of white covering the landscape and the temperature is hovering in the teens. However, the sun is out; daylight has extended itself from early in the morning until later in the day. Hope springs eternal for the groaning of spring. When I used to play a lot of golf, about this time of year I would begin the transition of switching the spot in the garage where the skis and the golf bag have their designated spaces. There would be the normal routine of cleaning the clubs, checking the grips, and making sure everything was ready to be in full swing—equipment, mind, body, spirit. Truth be told, all the preparation and best intentions resulted in mediocre golf scores. I never, however, let it ruin a good walk. I never achieved that level of a "scratch" golfer who could come anywhere close to shooting "par."

"Par," by the way, is how a golf course rates every hole. Par is the number of strokes that a player is expected to need to complete play of each individual hole and to complete the entirety of the course. If a hole is a par – 4, the goal would be to get the little round white ball into the cup with four blows. Yeah, right! Not in my world. But I digress. The word par has its derivation in the world of golf. In contemporary parlance, it has a variety of connotations. Most refer to an average, a normal amount, something usual/customary/ accepted, you know—a standard. Therefore, something below par is below average, or below the acceptable standard.

PAR

Modern psychology has done a lot of work on the importance of having a good sense of self-worth, on feeling OK about ourselves. So does the Christian faith. But our faith goes beyond this. God's goal for us is not simply that we feel OK; not that we simply shoot PAR; but rather has a much more powerful purpose of raising our commitments to, and for, the caring of others. In Christ it is not OK to remain simply OK. There should be no such thing as an average—Pres-PAR-terian! Especially in Pittsford! Sometimes it is not OK just to be OK. God has given us the ability to be exceptional. We can exceed mere Pres-Par-terianism.

Consider the fact that PAR for the average Presbyterian in giving is \$1337.00 per member. (Year 2017). General Assembly Officer for Research Services Reconcile that with the reality that the average giving per member for our congregation is \$710.86 (Year 2018). That's a pretty big spread. Yes:

- We are also acutely aware: 63 percent of Americans have less than \$500 in emergency savings
- Nearly half of Americans have no retirement savings
- Average American households have \$16,000 in credit card debt, \$27,000 in car debt, \$48,000 in student loan debt and \$169,000 in household mortgage.

I have often heard the statement invoked: "God loves us so much that God loves us just the way we are." More often I fail to hear the rest of the statement: "but, God loves us too much to let us stay the way we are." In the Christian faith we hear much that points us to this, with phrases like sanctification, growing in Christ, maturing, faith development, commitment, running the good race, spiritual formation, gratitude, and the stewardship of our lives. What an adventure this can mean for our lives if we all would strive to live into and up to it all. Conversely, when we become content with the usual routine. Our standards plummet below par.

Are we an average congregation? Are we above average as a congregation? Do you want to shoot PAR? Would you dare dream of doing better? These are the questions we consider in this Lenten season of self-examination. God calls us to realize the maximum potential of our lives. This calling demands the very best that we can do, believe, and give.

AN EXPRESSION OF SPIRITUALITY

Winston Churchill once said, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." The starting point of growing in faith is to raise our standards in the lives we want to build. God loves us just the way we are, but too much to let us stay that way. Without the rhetoric where is the growth? Without the teaching where is the learning? Without the modeling where is the imitation? Without the challenge where is the sense of accomplishment? Stewardship is an expression of our spirituality.

Much of our Christian faith can be dealt with in averages: an average church involvement, an average but good life ethically, an average concern for others, an average sense that God loves us just the way we are. I believe that a church's focus on sound principles of Christian stewardship are part and parcel of our spiritual growth, because it is one of the few times that we have to face our faith in a specific, concrete way. Disciples we, as faithful stewards can overcome the law of averages.

I'd love to shoot PAR. Those who've played with me know that's true. I just have no control over that little ball after it is struck by the club head. But I do have control over my priorities. I have complete control over the measure I give. If you think that your present giving is only OK, and out of your faith and gratitude would like to increase the proportion you return to God through the church, then you are encouraged to set forth on a specific plan. Set a long-term goal for what you would like to give as representing your faith. The biblical standard is 10 percent. One tenth, or even one fifth (and Presbyterians know a thing or two about fifths!). It may be a goal that you know you can't reach right away, but at least an ideal you want to work toward. Then set a short-term goal—it may be only a modest move toward the ideal. But remember the old proverb that a journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step. Start with little baby steps and grow into a full stride. The point is to increase your giving in a concrete, manageable way toward the long-term goals that you set. This is known as proportionate giving.

God loves us just the way we are, but too much for us to remain that way. Are you satisfied with being only OK in your life of faith, or are you ready for the challenge to grow? Let your life and actions really represent your faith! Move to exceed mere Pres-Par-terianism!

A strong sense of mission has long been foundational to our church. As we have reflected on our journey to date, and dreamed together about our future ministries, this pull towards reaching out to others has only strengthened. Like many others in our global Christian community, we have embarked on a journey from being a church that values mission to becoming a mis-

sional church. This transition invites each of us to find ways to live out our faith in the choices we make and the priorities we act out beyond the walls of our church home. It offers us opportunities to look at the immediate communities that make up our every day lives through the eyes of our Creator, to think of mission not as a task we do from time to time but as a way of being in the world, a way of looking at what happens around us and deciding how we want to respond.

One of the ways to realize this goal to more deeply embody mission, to follow Jesus out into the world, to meet people where they are, is to renew our focus on visiting the sick. Over the next three months, we will be creating a hospital visitation team. Volunteer visitors will commit to a regular schedule when they will be on call for anyone requesting a visit. Our team will be equipped with tools and training to extend pastoral care to our brothers and sisters encountering illnesses, new diagnoses, sudden changes in health and the many spiritual responses each of us has to such events.

Do you feel called to find out more? Does your heart fill with compassion when you hear of someone who is ill? Could you or a family member benefit from such a visit from someone in our community? To those who enjoy ministering through this family of faith:

First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford will contribute \$28,872 as its 2019 share for administrative and mission support of the Presbyterian Church USA, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. Here is the per person summary:

\$24.70 – per person spent locally in Rochester (Presbytery)

8.95 – per person for General Assembly (nationally and internationally)

\$33.65 – per person total that First Presbyterian Church provides our connectional church

Our church gives this Per Capita member support to fund the mission and ministry of the greater church. PDA (Presbyterian Disaster Assistance) administration is one of many items covered. Payment of Per Capita lets us use our outreach giving on mission trips we make to places like Columbia, SC or Baton Rouge, LA, and most recently Houston, TX. Locally, Per Capita covers the cost of our Presbytery Office so that we can do ministry with RAIHN, Grace House, ROC SALT and more. We will pay \$33.65 per member out of our budget.

Welcome to Our New Members!


