# The State of the Plate ~ The Meaningful Amount Or - oh my! The Preacher's gottin into some serious meddlin!!!

I have often heard the statement invoked: "God loves us so much that God loves us just the way we are." More often I fail to hear the rest of the statement: "But, God loves us too much to let us stay the way we are." In the Christian faith we hear much that points us to this with phrases like sanctification, growing in Christ, maturing, faith development, commitment, running the good race, spiritual formation, gratitude, and the stewardship of our lives. What an adventure this can mean for us when we no longer just stay the way we are! Yet, so easily, our faith journey, instead of being an adventure, can become a heavy chain of obligations. We cling to the status quo, hoping we can get by without too many crises or challenges. We become content with the usual routine.

Our giving, our financial support, can also become a complacent routine. Stewardship, simply put, is not a routine matter. It is a spiritual discipline. The impulse to give puts you in touch with the best part of yourself and the principles of abundance that are alive, well, and evident in your life. I like the way the Canadian Theologian Ken Walker puts it:

"In this context, the fundamental issue in Christian giving is not to make a connection between a believer's checkbook and a congregation's expenses, but to emphasize the much more meaningful relationship between a believer's financial resources and their faith in God."

Giving is not necessarily based on ability. I believe it is based on understandability. Hear me out. When we understand giving as an expression of gratitude for what we have received, we find ourselves on solid biblical footing. In addition, we are liberated from asking the perennial question, "How much should I give?" The question becomes, "Am I living up to my potential as a faithful steward?" Such an assessment requires brutal honesty. It also requires us to set aside all those things that limit vision and restrict enthusiasm.

Think of it this way: In the life of First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford, on the average, 1/3 of the operating budget comes from 26 households who pledge an average annual gift of \$9,300. Roughly 1/4 of the operating budget comes from 72 households who pledge an average of \$2,900. A little less than one fifth of planned pledged income comes from 123 households at an average of \$830. That's a total of 221 households out of a potential of 418 households. The aggregate of those pledges equals \$552,976. The annual operating budget is \$771,850. There are 195 households that provide support for the church but do not make a pledge or provide an indication of the level of their planned financial participation. That support is no less faithful, equally essential, and all are grateful for it.

Presbyterians, so say the statistics, on average, give a little north of 2% of their annual income. During the Great Depression it was 3.3%. The median income for a household in the town of Pittsford (according to Wikipedia) is \$119,500. We have 418 potential giving households in the life of this fellowship. 2% (\$2,390) of the median household income times 418 is well-nigh a million dollars. Think of all the marvelous ministries that take place in this fellowship that could be multiplied! Or, try this one. 150% of the federal poverty guidelines for a 3-member household comes to around \$32,000. Consider if everyone of our giving households (and there is the potential of 418) existed at the poverty level, say - \$32,000 a year. Consider further, if each household gave 5% of their annual income. Our pledged income would be nearly 700 K. The question to ponder: Am I living up to my potential as a faithful steward? All that really matters is the meaningful amount that you and God have figured out. That takes prayer, thought, humility, and a healthy dose of gratitude. Give what feels right. Not what is left.

# Says C.S.Lewis (Mere Christianity):

"I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare. If our giving habits do not at all pinch or hamper us, I should say they are too small. There ought to be things we want to do but cannot do because our giving expenditures exclude them."

The Easter event is a reminder that God loves us so much that God, in Jesus Christ, has given everything for us. God likewise loves us too much to let us stay the way we are. My choice is to respond in ways that are more than routine; based less on ability than understandability; are measured by a meaningful amount; are *proportionate*; and begin to tap at my true potential.

**April 11** - The Gilded Age by Mark Twain



From Amazon: The Gilded Age: A Tale of Today is a novel by Mark Twain and Charles Dudley Warner first published in 1873. It satirizes greed and political corruption in post—Civil War America in the era now referred to as the Gilded Age. Alt-

hough not one of Twain's best-known works, it has appeared in more than one hundred editions since its original publication. Twain and Warner originally had planned to issue the novel with illustrations by Thomas Nast. The book is remarkable for two reasons—it is the only novel Twain wrote with a collaborator, and its title very quickly became synonymous with graft, materialism, and corruption in public life.


# **Kenya Mission Trip**

A group of six volunteers traveled in March to the In Step Children's Home in Kitale, Kenya. Our church has been supporting the orphanage's 181 children for over 8 years. Adam Pollock worked at the home for the past 7 years. The first team performed a medical mission by bringing two dentists (Gary and Cindy Groves) and two dental assistants (Linda and Madison Ranslow). The team screened all the children and performed advanced dental work on 40 of them. Then the

70 staff members were able to have much needed work performed.

A few life-changing procedures were accomplished that now let the children smile with confidence and inner beauty. The other team (led by Dan Harrison and Dan Traina) did a construction project to divert water around the main dining hall and dormitory. A new walkway with curbs and gutters was poured with the help of eight local workers. This will allow runoff during rainy season to bypass the buildings. These projects were funded through your generous donations. Many thanks.

Another mission organization we worked with was A Wider Circle! Here, impoverished families are provided with everything they could possibly need to live a sustainable life. Donations are brought in constantly ranging from beds and chests of drawers, to suits and ties. A Wider Circle is all about helping families transition from homelessness to a furnished home, educational training, and a happy life. Some of us got to help with the heavy lifting as you can see to the right. All in all the trip was a huge success! Most importantly, the youth were able to learn that they could continue to make these differences right here in Rochester whenever they want. Until our next mission trip!
