# Embracing and Sharing Christ's Love

### CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

At the end of last year, data showed that the average workweek for all US employees is 38 hours per week. That average is up from 33 hours back in 2009. The point? The average American is working more than they used to work. If you're in the workforce, this is probably no surprise to you as you may have experienced this phenomenon in your own job. There are probably various explanations for this increase in work hours, such as the need to compensate for inflation and the increased cost of living. However, that's not the only explanation. One recent survey of over 200 high achievers showed that only 18% of them were expected to work more than 50 hours per week, and yet 49% of them reported working 50 hours or more anyway. For some reason, many people can't seem to stop themselves from overworking!

In casual conversations with one another, the question, "How are you?" often elicits the response, "I'm super busy at work," or, "I'm just trying to keep up with everything." Sometimes this is said with a hint of pride, as if busyness is a virtue. Do we really want to make busyness a virtue? Of course, busyness is sometimes necessary to earn enough money to simply make ends meet. But if we can help it, should we really add busyness to our lives? People often assume that we can get ahead in life by simply working harder and putting in more hours. I'm not sure that's true or that it's even good for us. A study conducted by the New Leaf Project Management company found that 50 hours on the job only produce about 37 hours of useful work. Are we working so much because it's making us productive or because it makes us feel virtuous to be "so busy"?

The story of creation in Genesis tells us that one of the first gifts God gave us was rest. Why is that? It seems that people tend to believe that our worth is tied up in our work. We feel we have to "do, do, do" and "work, work, work" or else... what good are we? I believe that God gave us the gift of rest in order to help combat that urge inside us. In his book *Sabbath as Resistance*, Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann describes the principle of sabbath in scripture as one of resisting the urge for incessant productivity. Sabbath says, "Instead of working, I will worship God." Sabbath says, "Instead of working, I will prioritize simply being with my family and friends." Sabbath says, "There are more important things in life than work." Sabbath says, "Whatever shortfall may occur to me because of not working, I will trust that God will provide."

Summertime is often a time for rest. Kids are off from school. There is time for family vacations. You might be tempted to take work with you to vacation. You might be tempted to fill up every moment of the summer with some activity in order to "keep busy." I encourage you to stop for a minute and consider your life. Do you need to work on vacation and keep so busy? Consider putting your laptop and your phone away, and focus on simply being with the people around you. We only get one life to live. Will your future self look back on these days and think, "Yes, this was the best use of my time?" I encourage you to use this summer to prioritize your most important relationships, to make time for worship and prayer, and to slow down enough to be grateful for the world around you.




### Thank You to All Teachers!
