CHARTING THE COURSE WITH PASTOR AARON

I love a book with a provocative title. One such book is called *Autopsy of a Deceased Church*. It was written by Thom Rainer, who is a well-known Christian researcher, author, and church consultant. Every year, approximately 5,000 churches close permanently. In the aforementioned book, Rainer gleans from his thirty-plus years of experience consulting with hundreds of churches to identify 12 common traits that exist in most churches that have died. The intent of the book is to help churches recognize those traits in themselves before it's too late and they can course correct. Some of the traits he identified include: the church was driven by its members' preferences; the church refused to look like its community; the church rarely prayed together; and the church had no clear purpose. To me, the most powerful of the traits he mentions is one he calls "slow erosion." The decline of a church's energy, ministry, and impact is often slow and imperceptible. Unless a church is paying close attention to itself, its people sometimes don't realize it's on the brink of extinction until just before it happens.

Again, the intent of the book is to help churches identify these deadly traits before it's too late. At the conclusion of the book, Rainer mentions some actions a church can take if they recognize they have some symptoms of "church sickness." Here are two of the actions that I think are relevant for us here at First Presbyterian. #1 Pray that God will open the eyes of the leadership and members for opportunities to reaching into the community where the church is located. #2 Take an honest audit of how church members spend their time being involved.

We are in the middle of our Faith Forward initiative. During this process, our church leadership will be reviewing, discerning, and updating our mission, vision, and core values as a church, as well as creating a "roadmap" to help us become the future church God desires us to be. Toward #1 above, I ask you to pray that, through Faith Forward, we will see more opportunities to adapt ourselves to the needs of the people who live here in Greater Rochester. Toward #2 above, the church just finished completing the Transforming Church Insight survey. Thanks to those who completed it. Additionally, our personal consultant Kevin will be visiting us in June to facilitate focus groups of various cross-sections of the church to find out what you love about our church and what you'd like to see change. Some of you will be participating in those focus groups, and all of you will have the opportunity to meet Kevin if you come to worship on June 18. After Kevin's visit in June, we will have finished the "Discovery Phase" of the process and will receive a Discovery Report in the summer, detailing their analysis of what they learned from the survey and focus groups. The "Visioning Phase" begins in October.

Please keep First Presbyterian Church in prayer as we do the important work of the Faith Forward initiative and seek to reverse the effects of slow erosion.



Habitat for Humanity GREATER ROCHESTER INTERFAITH BUILDERS "GRIB"

What is "Greater Rochester Habitat for Humanity"?

As of January 1, 2023, Flower City Habitat for Humanity merged with Ontario and Wayne counties to form **Greater Rochester Habitat for Humanity "GRHFH"**. This new entity is the local Habitat for Humanity site which builds affordable homes using volunteer labor and "sweat equity" hours by the future homeowner. Over 250 homes have been built in the Rochester area through Habitat for Humanity.

What is "Habitat Interfaith Partnership" (HIP)?

Our church belongs to the Pittsford area "Habitat Interfaith Partnership" (HIP) supporting GRHFH. HIP has recently lost major funding from some of our partner churches making it difficult to meet its previous commitment of building one house every three years. All other Rochester area faith coalitions have also been struggling to fundraise and find volunteers.

What is "Greater Rochester Interfaith Builders" or "GRIB"?

The Rochester area faith coalitions (Pittsford "HIP", Brighton, Greece, Webster, Penfield, and Perinton) have formed an "Umbrella" coalition called the *Greater Rochester Interfaith Builders" or "GRIB"*. Each individual coalition pledges a certain amount towards the \$100,000 yearly goal and collectively we will build a house each year.

How does our church support HIP and the GRIB?

Our Mission and Outreach Committee budgets a yearly donation to HIP for its pledge to GRIB. Have you ever bought a pie for Thanksgiving at church? That is one of many fundraisers for Habitat. Our church members are eager volunteers on the job site, sawing, hammering, painting, landscaping, and helping to build homes.

When will the next GRIB home be built?

Starting in July, GRIB will break ground on Akerman Street in the Beechwood area of Rochester. This will be a 2-story, 3-bedroom home.

How can I help?

There will be plenty of volunteer opportunities. No skills are required! There will be onsite education and tools are provided. *Caution, you may become addicted!* Look for volunteer opportunity postings in the bulletin and other church communications. Sign-up sheets will be in Fellowship Hall.

How can I donate?

Buy a pie, send a check to our church designated "Habitat Build," or make an RMD from your IRA to our church for Habitat. You can donate items to ReStore which supports GRHFH. A skilled "deconstruction crew" at NO CHARGE will gladly remove your kitchen cabinets and counters. Appliances, furnishings and more are welcomed.


Welcome to Our New Members

Celebrating Cameron Community Ministries


Cameron Community Ministries recently held their 40th Anniversary Gala featuring the spectacular Cameron Kids Steppers and Choir just formed this year. Joining Executive Director Olivia Kassoum-Amadou as co-hosts were Mayor Malik Evans, Rep. Joe Morelle, and WROC news anchor Natalie Kucko. Cameron guests included several local businesses and organizations. The Presbytery of Genesee Valley was recognized for its founding role and partnership. The Rev. Michelle Sumption accepted an award on behalf of the Presbytery and its churches. Guests who work collaboratively in mission with Cameron attended from the Presbytery, First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford, Christ Church Pittsford, Irondequoit Presbyterian, and others.

Cameron is an urban outreach community center located in the Lyell-Otis neighborhood that addresses basic needs and emergency services to help families and individuals achieve self-sufficiency. It is a high-crime district with a violent crime rate of six times higher than suburbs and 60% higher than the city's average.
