## A WEE WORD FROM DR. WEENINK

### Appreciative Expression

If I asked you to count how many times you said “thank you” today, how would you respond? After all, it is one of the most essential phrases in any language. That said, when you really think about it, you probably don’t say “thank you” as often as you’d like.

All will agree that it is more than appropriate to say “thanks” when someone extends a favor, when a gift is received, or when some form of kindness is extended. How often do you thank a friend or colleague for waiting for you when you’re running late; for listening to you when you feel sad or stressed and just need to express yourself; or for giving you a compliment or constructive feedback? How often do you thank a spouse or loved one for all they do?

Let’s be honest here – sometimes we all fall into the bad habit of taking things for granted.

“When people are grateful, they feel more alert and alive,” says Robert Emmons, a professor of psychology at the University of California, Davis, and the author of *Gratitude Works!* Emmons continues, “The expression of gratitude is important, too—it strengthens relationships.”

The often quoted William Arthur Ward put it well:

“Feeling gratitude and not expressing it is like wrapping a present and not giving it.”

Said the Roman Philosopher and Orator Cicero:

“Gratitude is not only the greatest of virtues, but the parent of all others.”  
*Pro Plancio, 54 B.C.*

A suitable sibling to gratitude is **appreciation**. Appreciation is rooted in a deep sense of gratitude. Heartfelt appreciation is a muscle we’ve not spent much time building, or felt encouraged to build.

A-p-p-r-e-c-i-a-t-i-o-n is an act of admiration in which one communicates approval. It is a form of valuing. When one thinks about it—it is something that rises rather than depreciates.

- To be appreciative is to ascend above polite plaudits and respectful well-wishes.
- To be appreciative is to scale simply good manners and social refinement.
- To be appreciative elevates us beyond and above a sense of indebtedness or being beholden.

Appreciation implies understanding and comprehension. To be appreciative implies an alert, perceptive, conscious, cognizant, mindful, enlightened awareness. It is an informed, intentional, insightful discernment.

The first quarter of 2018 we gave significant attention to something called Appreciative Inquiry. During that time members and friends were invited to reflect upon and take inventory of all that they most appreciate about the ministry we all share in Christ's name here at First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford. It was a helpful, generative, uplifting, productive, revelatory exercise that yielded forth good fruits.

The remaining months of 2018 our focus will orient us toward a time of Appreciative Expression. It is our prayer that this time of Appreciative Expression will be an exercise that will be equally helpful, revelatory, generative, uplifting, productive, and will yield forth good fruits.

Appreciative Expression takes the focus off us and places it on God's purpose and direction. It is fueled from our heartfelt thanks to God for what we have, for what God has done, and drives a lifestyle of worship and adoration. Appreciative Expression allows us to savor, respond to, and value all things with respect and honor. In moving from Appreciative Inquiry to Appreciative Expression we engage ourselves in the spiritual discipline of stewardship.

Though everything belongs to God, we have freedom as God's stewards to use what has been entrusted to us in any number of ways. When we choose to give back to God some of what we have freely received, our relationship with God is renewed and transformed. This is Appreciative Expression at its best. Generosity and commitment are not driven by guilt, but grow out of gratitude.

It is customary for the First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford to trust the generosity and commitment of members, adherents, and friends to assist in planning, proposing, and ultimately meeting a balanced budget. Your response has always justified that trust. Now, more than ever, everyone needs to play their part. Your Appreciative Expression, your 'Tithe,' your 'Proportionate Gift,' the 'meaningful amount' you prayerfully decide upon, the measure-you-give; what you set aside for God's work will enable your church to meet (and maybe exceed!) the challenges and opportunities of our ministry and mission for 2019. It is all contingent upon everyone's Appreciative Expression.

Remember, our stewardship is more than merely dollars given to meet a budget; it is part and parcel of what it means to be a Christian. It turns faith into action. And above all, it is an opportunity for meaningful, measurable, tangible, touchable Appreciative Expression.

## **Clergy Renewal Grant Awarded for March 6 – May 31, 2019**

Christian Theological Seminary of Indianapolis, IN has awarded the First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford on behalf of the Rev. Dr. Carrie Mitchell a grant of \$50,000 as part of its Lilly Endowment-funded clergy renewal program. This highly competitive program annually grants up to \$50K to approximately 145 congregations and empowers congregations to support their pastors with the gift of extended time away from ministerial responsibilities for reflection and renewal. The Session has acted to gratefully and enthusiastically accept this grant.

Recognizing Carrie's sixteen years serving this congregation and her acting as the Head of Staff last fall as we awaited the arrival of our Interim Pastor, the Personnel Committee including Dr. Weenink, encouraged Carrie to apply for this grant. Clergy Renewal periods are not vacations but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for drinking again from God's life-giving waters, for regaining enthusiasm and creativity for ministry.

Since the Lilly Endowment introduced the National Clergy Renewal Program grants in 2000, more than 2,500 congregations across the nation have participated in the program. Congregations in the 2017 program received grants totaling more than \$6.5 million. First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford counts itself fortunate to now be counted in that number. These Clergy Renewal grants recognize the tremendous amount of energy, time, and leadership that pastors invest in their congregations.

Some may have questions about the timing for this renewal period. When we stop and think about it: Is there any perfect time? Your leadership has come to the conclusion that the timing for this renewal period could not be better. The congregation is energized and stable with an effective ministry team in place. Our ministry and mission is on a steady stride. The PNC is in place and there have not been any disruptions in our busy parish life. In fact, new initiatives have taken root and all that we treasure has been kept intact.

The collective experience of congregations who have previously been awarded these grants has been noted growth and new energy emerging during the period of Clergy Renewal. It is safe to say that the congregations have experienced a time of renewal as well. New leaders emerge, new models for ministry are explored, individuals and groups innovate, and shared ownership deepens spiritual practices and commitments.

The best part of it all is that this award will not cost the congregation anything, yet everyone benefits! The Personnel Committee will determine the appropriate pastoral presence needed and seek the right personnel to ensure continuity of care. A Resurrection Renewal Team of key leaders from the committees and groups staffed by Carrie will play a role in coverage. Carrie, Jeffrey, the Personnel Committee, Session members all stand ready to answer any questions you may have. You can also rest assured that additional communication about how the Clergy Renewal period will take form and shape will be regularly shared with you.

During her renewal period, Carrie and her family will be reflecting upon gratitude practices embracing variability and vulnerability. Upon her return, she will share these reflections and encourage others to do the same. It is with gratitude to God that we embark upon this life-sustaining opportunity. It is a blessing. It is a gift. This Clergy Renewal experience will bring forth green shoots of growth for all who are involved.

The lens on human behavior developed by Dr. Murray Bowen and applied to congregations and leadership by Rabbi Edwin Friedman has proven to be an extremely significant contribution for many helping professionals. Leaders in many areas - from ministry to nursing, from business to teaching, and beyond - use the lens of Dr. Bowen's family systems theory to better understand themselves as well as the people with whom they work.

The Voyagers, a group of leaders of faith communities, has been gathering for almost 20 years to study Bowen Theory. At the fall, 2018 meeting in Buffalo, we are offering two opportunities for people to learn about and increase their understanding of theory.

**First is a one-day introductory seminar with a focus on Bowen theory** and its application to families, congregations and other institutions, presented by the Voyagers. The importance of family of origin work for maturity, functioning and leadership, and the opportunity to work on one's own family diagram will be offered. Date: Wed., Nov. 14. Dr. Kerr will present on his new book: *Bowen Theory's Secrets: The Hidden Life of Families*. Dr. Kerr will describe family functioning from the perspective of Bowen theory, distinguishing it from more individually-focused psychological perspectives. Date: Thurs., Nov. 15. 




